Explanations, Abbreviations, Etc.

For convenience the records of the various Lewis families are divided into Books and each Book into chapters. At the head of each Book appears the name of the earliest known ancestor of that family. The List of Books is a complete index to the Books as published to this time. New Books will be added from time to time as new branches of the Lewis family are found. Waitstill Lewis (3160) b Mar. 24, 1755, came from Rhode Island via Barrington, where he lived for some time. Nothing very definite is known of his early life. He left New England during the troubled period of the rebellion from Great Britain. The Lewis family is a very extensive one in the United States and elsewhere. We find from an advertisement in the Halifax Gazette of 1772 that a Waitstill Lewis resided in that city for some time. Waitstill Lewis, of Yarmouth, had sisters living in Boston about 1812, and before the war of that date two of his daus., including Mary—afterwards Mrs. Stoneman—visited them. He also is understood to have had a

brother living in Cumberland, Nova Scotia.

Why we settled there, I do not know.
Perhaps it was the pure springs of

A Southington Clipping.

The burning of the house on Wolcott Mountain on Monday night, occupied by Edward Holmes, destroyed an ancient landmark of especial interest to residents of Wolcott and Southington. It was built nearly 150 years ago and originally occupied by Captain Nathaniel Lewis (160) of revolutionary fame, and was the birthplace and early home of his noted son, Addin Lewis (186) mayor of Mobile, Ala., who endowed Lewis Academy, now Lewis High School, munificently for those times. His gift was \$15,000, a portion of which was to be used in erecting a suitable building. He also gave to the town of Wolcott, \$5,000, the income of which was to be used for educational purposes. Captain Nathaniel Lewis died in the old homestead at the age of 91 years. His tombstone in the old cemetery near the Southington reservoir bears the inscription, "An honest man." His military commission, signed by Jonathan Trumbull is in the possession of his great-grandson, Selectman Augustine M. Lewis (1253) of this town.

The report of the committee goes on to say that “Mrs. Tyrrell came down at the first call for aid, and remained constantly and untiringly laboring for the relief and comfort of the sick. In her section it was commonly reported that she was the first Army Nurse who had volunteered to go and serve at the front. The fact of Mrs. Tyrrell’s general service is fully confirmed by many soldiers of the 9th Iowa Volunteers; sixty-eight members of the G. A. R. and W. R. C. of West Union attest to Mrs. Doolittle’s excellent character. The same persons mentioned above, who have known this lady, both as Mrs. Tyrrell and as Mrs. Doolittle, confirm the fact of this applicant being the identical Mrs. Tyrrell who served as Army Nurse, which fact is also confirmed by affidavits of this applicant. This lady is now 82 years of age, and fully deserving of the aid asked.”
