The records are divided into Books: all who can trace their pedigree to a *common ancestor* will find *his name* at the head; each name is numbered when first printed; if the name is repeated the No follows in brackets; b.=born; d.=died; m.=married; m. (1)=1st wife, etc.; dau=daughter; instead of repeating the name of a place in the same paragraph, initials only are given; in writing matter for printer use only one side of sheet, use note or letter size paper; leave at least an inch space at the top and a half inch space at left side of each sheet; use two sheets only for a chapter; always indicate the Book to which the records belong; in other letters turn sheet on end, so the foot of one page will be top of next page. Any person whose record shows their death before 20 years of age will be considered as dying unmarried and their names will not appear the second time unless for some special reason. Write all middle names in full. In giving dates—give day, month, year. Answer all questions as fully as possible and give names of such people as you think may be able to complete the record. Old newspaper files, tomb stones, cemetery, church, school, town, county and probate, records and family bibles should be examined and old people consulted. In preparing records for publication, be sure and include the information suggested by the following:

The Delaware County Clerk's records show a deed dated Feby. 12, 1802, from Charles Wharton to Randall Lewis, for 60 acres of land in the town of Delhi, N. Y.; and that Randall Lewis deeded the same land to Stewart Dean, April 18, 1815.

Mr. Carl A. Lewis, of New Haven, and one of the editors of Book 8, is entitled to credit for contributing the following in relation to the kinship of Books 1 and 8.

Amos Lewis (57½) and Abel Lewis (57½, Book 8) were brothers. Abel had among other children Asa and Augustus. Asa Lewis (13, Book 1) may have received his name from Abel's son Asa. This Augustus married Esther, a dau. of Abraham (56 Book 8). In Abraham's family was an Abel, who had a son Abel. This last Abel would be of the same generation as Betsey (134 Book) and probably were husband and wife. I have been trying to solve the problem through the Greene branch.

Eleanor Randall, of Westerly, married Mch. 19, 1714, Benjamin Greene. Of their 8 children, Humility Greene married Ichabod Randall; Eleanor Greene, married Amos Lewis (57½ Book 8); Amy Greene m. Elisha Lewis, (probably 59, Book 8) and a cousin of Amos (54½); Caleb Greene Randall's son Caleb (7 Book 1) was probably named after Caleb Greene: Mat hew is not a family name in Book 8, but Amos had a son Matthew. I

reason then: that Eleanor Greene Lewis, the wife of Amos, named at least two of her children: one Matthew because she had a brother Matthew, and one Randall because her mother was a Randall, and she had a brother-in-law, Icabod Randall. Is not this a natural, a reasonable and a logical conclusion?

Again if Randal Lewis (1 Book 1) was the son of Amos (57½ Book 8) the Lewises who were together at Petersburg, N. Y., were cousins. The Greenes removed to the same place later.

This conclusion corroborates the late Edna Lewis Briggs (26 Book 8) when she said "she had heard her father say that Randal Lewis was his kinsman." I find it hard to locate Amos Lewis (57½ Book 8), but I think the following is an explanation. In 1696, the Court of Conn. granted Voluntown to the Volunteers in the Narragansett war. Among the list made July 1, 1701, is John Lewis (8, Book 8). His share would naturally fall to his eldest son Joseph (17) father of Amos. In Joseph's (17) will he speaks of his oldest son Joseph (54) as dead, and makes Amos of Voluntown, administrator. In all probability then Amos was his second son and had his grandfather's right at Voluntown. He returned to Hopkinton to settle his father's estate and perhaps remained there, for in the marriage certificate of his son, Matthew, he is spoken of as of Hopkinton. In the census of 1774, Amos and Amos-Jr. were in Hopkinton; Randal was in Exeter; and Matthew was in Coventry.

Lydia (180) Lewis, (July 1888 LEWIS LETTER), according to the family Bible, (now in the possession of her son, John L. Ross, of Providence, R. I.) "was born in Coventry, R. I., on Sunday January the 2d day, A. D. 1789," and "deceased on Thursday morning, March the 13th, 1823, after an illness of four days." She was "joined in marriage on Sunday, March the 14th, 1813," by Rev. Wm. Stone, to James Lewis Ross (220). (See LEWIS LETTER, Aug. 1888.)

James Lewis Ross, "was born in Voluntown, on Monday February the 13th day, A. D., 1786," and died Sept. 28, 1844. He worked at farming summers and in winter taught school.

The following is the list of children as copied from the family Bible, now in the possession of the sixth child, John L. Ross, of Providence, R. I.:

Betsey (1028) died March 13, 1816. She was married Dec. 7, 1840, at Coventry, by Rev. James Burlingame, to IKA WEST, and had two children, both of whom died young.

Lydia (1032) died Aug. 7, 1847. She was married March 14, 1841, at Coventry, by Rev. James Burlingame to LYMAN REYNOLDS, and had a son, Edwin M., and two daughters.

Eason (168) Lewis, was born in Coventry, R. I., about 1793, and died at Black Rock, N. Y., Aug. 1, 1846. He was married Oct. 24, 1819 to Phebe Theodosia Hazard, youngest dau. of John and Mary (Tillinghast) Hazard, b. in Scituate, R. I., Dec. 31, 1795; d. Nov. 21, 1875. They were married on Escoheag Hill, West Greenwich, R. I., in a house (now in a dilapidated condi-

tion, and unused), built about 1812, by her father, John Hazard, who was born on Escobeg Hill, Aug. 12, 1767 and died there aged 84 years. Eason and Phebe Lewis had children :

Eason Lewis left Rhode Island in November 1825, and his wife not hearing from him, obtained a decree of divorce about three years after. It was subsequently learned that he went to Niagara Falls, where he married Hapylona , and after residing there one year, went to Black Rock, a village in Erie-co., N. Y., on the Niagara river, two miles north of Buffalo. Black Rock is now a part of Buffalo, having been annexed Jan. 1, 1854. Here he lived several years and had a family of two boys and two girls. But little was heard of them until Aug. 1846, when his then widow wrote to Rhode Island to Benj. Tillinghast, Jr., Mr. Lewis' son-in-law, informing him of her husband's death. In the letter dated Aug. 29, 1846, she wrote as follows: "I have to inform you that he is no more. He was drowned in Black Rock Harbor, 1st day of August, 1846, in trying to save another man who was to work for him on the same job. He failed in the attempt, and both sunk to the bottom together: were got out in ten or fifteen minutes. The man was brought to life, when Col. Lewis, to the disappointment of all was dead. His body is interred in Black Rock burying ground by the side of son George, who died two years before him, a child a little over three years old. He has left myself and three children to mourn his loss; the oldest, Sabra J. Lewis, 12 years old last May. The next is John Lewis, 10 years old last February; the youngest is Eliza Ann Lewis, 8 years old 27th last January. She is living with her Uncle and Aunt, Mr. Koot, who married my sister, at Tonawanda, or he lives at that place, a small village about 9 miles east of Black Rock and I expect to let them bring her up as they have no children." By occupation, when in Rhode Island, Eason Lewis was a farmer. He was in build, tall and portly, weighing two hundred pounds. He was much given to military duty, as it was the custom in his day for every county to support their own militia. He was at one time Colonel of the Kent County Brigade, under the supervision of General Babson, and in appearance won the compliments of many as being as noble a looking officer as ever rode a horse. As a man, his traits of character were good hearted, generous, brave and daring, keeping a presence of mind that fitted him to fight his way through any emergency he encountered. He was full of fun and frolic and a man liked by all his associates. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge at Rice City, Coventry, R. I. At the time of his death he was superintending a section of the Erie Canal.

After his death nothing definite was heard from his family, but it was reported that his widow afterwards married again and went farther West. The writer has endeavored several times to find a trace of them but without success. Any information concerning them will be gladly received by the writer, or by Mr. Lewis' two daughters, Mrs. Benj. Tillinghast, Escobeg Hill, R. I., and Mrs. Stafford Greene, Grass Valley, Nevada Co., Cal.

He then when 16 years old entered the small ware store of Ordway, Prince & Co. at 15 Milk Street, Boston, as clerk, then as salesman, then as drummer, travelling over Canada and the west, then as partner for awhile, then entered in business for himself, establishing the house of "Lewis, Brown & Co., at 44 Summer Street. He was burned out by the great fire of Nov. 9, 1872. He saved forty thousand dollars value of goods by great exertion and lost \$80,000 in goods by the fire. In a few days he opened a store on summer, near Washington Street and continued the business as usual, until his former store was rebuilt, when he returned to the old stand, and in 1883 his health failing, he sold out to his partner and made a long trip to the west taking his family with him, and visited Nevada, Idaho, climbing Pike's Peak by the way, and returned by way of the lakes and St. Lawrence and spent the fall on the seashore at Portsmouth, N. H., and the island of

Nantucket. He was elected to the Common Council of Boston, and was the President of that body in 1867. He was on the committee of annexation in 1868 when Boston absorbed a large amount of territory. He was appointed a prison commissioner by the Governor of Mass., the commission having charge of the State Prison, and he was chairman of the Board and having discovered irregularities by a high official, he demanded his discharge, which demand being refused, he resigned his office. He was elected a Trustee of the Boston Public Library, and served for many years. He was appointed as a member of the "State Board of Arbitration," and became Chairman of that Board. The Board won a high place in the public regard and still retains it. Being offered the Presidency of the manufacturers Bank of Boston, he resigned his office on the Board and assumed the office of President of the Bank. According to family tradition Nehemiah was a commissioned officer of the Revolution (?) He d. between 1780 and 1784, but how or where is unknown. He also lived in Georgia, Vt., for his name and three of Michael Merritt's

GENEALOGY OF THE LEWIS FAMILY FROM
THE 10TH CENTURY.

Descendants of Guathvoed Lewis of Van Guathvoed, Vicar the Great, Lord of Ystrad Towy, and Guynore County, Canmaithen South Wales, son of Cladnen Groysted, Prince of Powys by Meroydt daughter and heir of Owain Lord of Cardigan.

The Welsh heralds have attributed to Guathvoed for Armes.

"Argent: A Lyon rampant sable."

Motto: "Obuir na obna angau," translated: "Fear him who fears not death."

The repeated answer of that chieftain to the Saxon Edgar, when ordered with other Welch leaders to row his barge upon the Dee. What ever their origin, these Armes with transposed colors, and this motto with a Lyon rampant Argent for crest, have been used by every branch of the family from an early period, and the motto has been ill exchanged for the Latin "Patria fidus" adopted within the last two centuries by the Lanishan, the new house branch now the main line of Lewis.

Transportation of the colors in the armes is held to have been adopted in courtesy to the rank and possessions of Mewydd, who bore "Sable, a *Lyon rampant argent*. Cydrych, son of Guathvoed, Lord of Straddowy and Guynore Co.

Canmaithen married Nest, daughter of Tangus, son of Cydfal, prince of Arbudroy, in Meiriouth, and sister of Collyn, son Tangus, head of one of the 15 tribes of Wales. They had first Griffith, Lord of Guynavae, second Codifer, third Clydwen.

Codifer, son of Cydrich, Lord of Iseaech the district of Senghenydd, above the Creach (river) in Morganney. He married Mevenwy, dau. of Gwrgan, son of Itheldan, son of Owain, son of Mongan, Lord Glenargar, who bore "Gules 3 charms argent."

Meyrie, son of Codifer, Lord of Iseaech married Gwladys, dau. of Eiddys, Lord Guent, who bore "Per Pale, azure and sable 3 Fl. de Lys or interpreted (3 flowers of lilies in gold).

Ivor Back, son of Meyrick, married Nest, dau. and heir of Madoc, son of Caradoc, son of Eimon, son of Collwin, Lord of Senghenydd, of which territory she was heiress.

Giraldas Cambrendis, states that Wm. Earl of Gloucester attempted to deprive Ivor of his camels, upon which the Welch rose headed by Ivor, and in the night time scaled the walls of Cardiff Castle, and in the face of a garrison of 120 men at arms, archers and guards, carried off the Earl, his countess, and their son and held them until they got their own terms. Ivor held the ground above Castle Coch, and finally retired to the hills above Merthyr, since occupied by Morlais Castle. He was afterwards slain in battle at a place called Pant Cad Ivor, and now known, in railway phraseology as the Pant, Ivor and Nest. Had first Griffith, 2d, Llewelyn Hager whence a branch. 3d, Philip son of Ivor who married Catherine dau. of Iloweyn Lord of Glynhedd who bore a "charm between 3 flowers de lys."

(3 flowers of lilies) and had Ellen, who m. Thomas son of Llewelyn. 4, Wenlliam, m. Morgan Vicar.

The Lewis of Van, were for many centuries the leading Welch Lords of East Glamorgan, and the principal of several families in the district who claimed descent from Guathvoed, Prince of Cardigan. Guathvoed's descendants ranged from Seenfrith on the east to Castle Odwin on the west and in east Glamorgan includes the Mathews of Llandaff (the ancestors of father Mathews, the great temperance apostle.)

Wm. alias Cromwell of Whitchurch—Lewis of Rhimpera—Glynn of Roath, Thomas of Llanbradanech, and the Cadets (younger ones) of these families.

Cydrych one of the older sons, of Guathvoed is regarded as the ancestor of Lewis Codifer son of Cydrych is Lord Iseach or the division of the Great Cantref of Saughenydd, north of the Creach river.

How Codifer gained a footing in the district of Morganwog is not known, perhaps by his marriage with Mawenwy dau. of Gargan son of Ithal and aunt to Yes-tyn, the last Prince of the district and the footing was probably strengthened by the marriage of his son Meyric with the Glayds dau. of Eiddyn Welch Lord of the Contiguous territory of Gwent. It was however under their celebrated son Ivor Back that the family attained its full breath of possessions and its great power. In the distributions of lands at the conquest Eion son of Collwyn received Cantref of Saughenydd (St. Kenyth) an immense but valueless Lordship wholly mountainous, lying between the Taff and the Rynney rivers and extending from the borders of Breckaouk to Whitchurch by Cardiff by his marriage with the heiress of the Lordship Nest, only child of Madoe, son Caradoc son of Eion.

Ivor Back with the Welch title of Lord Royal of Senghenydd, gained an almost inaccessible and thoroughly Welch territory with a frontier which approached in dangerous proximity to the Normans hold of Cardiff. A bold leader thus strong in position and popular with the repressed but by no means vanquished countrymen, was not likely to be long without a legitimate cause of action and in 1158, he stormed the Castle and took Wm. Earl of Gloucester, his countess his son (a child) as hostages to the mountains and retained them until he had made his own terms.

I must now draw nearer our own time and pass over many intermediate personages in the line of descent. Edward Lewis was a very wealthy person. The

country having been settled, he removed the family seat to the Van, a hamlet of Redwas but in Glamorgan and where all but the Castle of Caephelly was his own property. Here he inclosed a park and probably built the old part of the Manor house and circular dove cote which still remains. This dove cote is rather a singular building; built in the form of a cone and is large enough to contain thousands of pigeons.

He was a purchaser of church lands, and added Roath Keynsham to his estate. He held the newly received and then real dignity of Scheriff in 1548, and 1555, and 1559, and deputy Custos, of the Co. The end of Pembroke, being Custos; by Ann Morgan of Paucead, a cadet of Tredegar, he had several children of whom Wm. founded the line of Glyn'Taff now extinct, and Edward that of Llanesha the only male stock remaining. His children intermarried with Kemeys of Kemeys, and Cefas Mably Herbert of Colebrook Ruton of Worlton—Vin of Narcross—and Prichard of Llanover.

Thomas Lewis of Van, next in descent was sheriff and deputy Custos. He either purchased or inherited Windy Manor in Gwent, and he built a grand square house with an interior court in Cardiff by the Taff river which is not yet entirely destroyed, (1881). He built the great gallery and porch at Van. His property and the fact of his death at Cardiff, Nov. 2, 1593, are set forth in the usual inquisition. By Margaret Gamage of Coety he had:

George, who founded the family of Lewis Llystalybent (Cardiff) and others, who married with Thomas of Llanbradach.
Matthew of Castell of Mynach.
Herbert of Cogan.
Fleming of Flemingstan.

Sir Edward Lewis of Van, the eldest son was also a large purchaser of land, born in 1560, he was sheriff in 1601 and knighted in 1603. He purchased St. Fagan Castle and Penhevad from Wm. Herbert 1615-1616—Penmark Place—Odynsffe and Splet, from Sir Wm. Rawdrick, and Camleoyd and Cantown, from Thomas Wildgas and other parties. He also had a limited interest in Llantrythed and in the Manor house and Park of Radyr. He died Jan. 22, 1623 and is buried at Redwas in Canphelly. By his wife Blanche Morgan at Machen he had several children of whom Sir Wm. was of Celpach Yargoed in Gilligar, where his descendants founded the Gilligan Charity. Nicholas was of Camleoyd, and Thomas had Penmark Place which has descended

from him to Col. Kemayds Synte of Cefae Mably. The two dau. married Sir Lewis Maetd of Morgan and Henry Price of Newton, ancestor of Lord Dynevor.

Sir Edward Lewis next in succession was of the Privy chambers of Prince Henry, and Prince Charles, and was knighted in White Hall. He purchased the Manor and Prury of Edington in Wilts and lived and died there, to the neglect of Van, Oct. 10, 1630. He married Lady Ann Sackville, widow of Lord Beauchamp and they lie under a fine alter tomb at Edington.

Edward, their oldest son was of Van and Edington, but his children died young.

Wm. the 3d son, married the heiress of Boarstall Tower and Brill estate, which were descended from the Conquest and which passed enlarged to his two daughters and married in succession Wm Jepson, Sir Inoanbry, Sir C. Remeys and Dr. Aubrey but left no issue.

The other also childless m. Sir Francis Deyvell and Wm. Morgan of Fredegar.

The Boarstall estate was left to the Aubreys though not of kin and is still held by them.

The Glamorgan estates reverted to the male heir Richard Lewis.

Richard Lewis of Van, purchased the Manor of Corshan and is there buried. He was also of Edington which he or his son sold. He neglected and probably dismantled Van, and when in the country used Saint Fagan and old Manor house built by Dr. Gibbon within the walls of the old Castle of the De Veles. The son and successor of Richard was Thomas Lewis 22d and last in male descent from Gusthvoed and the last Lewis of Van, which place speedily became a ruin. He sold Corshan house and Manor to the Matthews in 1706, and alienated Energlyn and other property from the Welch estates. He purchased and resided at Soterton in Hamshire and is sometimes described as of St. Fagan. He represents 7 places in nine Parliaments and died in 1736. His only child Elizabeth married Othor Windsor May 7, 1730, afterwards 3d Earl of Plymouth. The estates then much incumbered were sold under a private act and those in Glamorgan bought in, since that time the property now very large and very well and liberally managed has wanted the blessing of a resident proprietor.

The oldest descendant of the Lewis now living is Mr. Harry Lewis of Greenmaden near Cardiff. He is not the heir to the estates but possesses considerable wealth, and a Justice of the Peace, much esteem-

ed by all who knew him. Unfortunately he lost his sight some years since. Mr. Windham Lewis was the heir and he died in 1873 and left a widow and one child. The Rev. Wm. Lewis of New House left a widow but no children, and she was afterwards married to the present Prime Minister of England, Mr. Disraeli. The minister having refused knighthood his lady accepted the title of Lady Baconfield who is since dead.

Roger Williams the founder of Rhode Island was a Lewis on the mother's side.

(I am indebted for the above to Talieson Williams, Esq.)

"I am," he writes, "sorry that I am unable to give the origin of the 'Lewis Arms,'" having searched all the available authority, nor do I believe that the meaning is recorded. When you come to Cardiff I shall have great pleasure in showing you a very fine picture, the storming of the Castle by Ivor Back. The composition is very fine. The principal figure being Ivor, with his sword in hand compelling the Earl to sign the Welch charter in the midst of the dead and dying. You may have some idea of the size of the beautiful picture when I tell you that the frame cost 50 guineas. The picture itself was a presentation to the town of Cardiff. My dear friend I hope the enclosed manuscript will satisfy your friend, for I believe that it is as authentic as can be had. Though I have not given you a title of what may be had, I have also sent you a sketch of the Van, as it now stands, drawn by a friend of mine expressly for you. I often wonder of the coincidence that you should write to me for these documents not knowing that I had lived for years within $\frac{1}{2}$ mile of the Van. When you come here we will go over to Canphelly. We then shall see the Van and the largest castellated ruin in the kingdom. It is only 7 miles from Cardiff.

Receive my dear friend the assurance of the kind regards of your old friend, Talieson Williams.

Our great grandfather Edward Lewis, sen., was b. in Wales and emigrated to America in 1717 and married Sarah Morris dau. of Daniel Morris who was the son of Stephen Morris one of the first settlers of Morris Co., N. J. Daniel lived at Baskingridge, N. J., in 1744.
