### Who Were Your Ancestors.

FROM THE CONGREGATIONALIST.

What is there petty or ill-advised in the study of one's family line? It is natural to desire to learn who and what the men and women were whose blood flows in our own veins, many of whose traits we more or less consciously illustrate, and to whom we owe what we have and are in a far higher degree than we often appreciate. Many a helpful lesson is learned by genealogical research. It is not dry digging among dead bones. It is a branch of study most fascinating in itself, even if it had no other attractions. But there is inspiration in discovering that one is descended from this man or that woman, once loved and honored among the sturdy pioneers who settled our country, perhaps even famous in church or state here or on the other side of the Atlantic.

It is a help to manhood, to culture, to piety to know one's self akin to those who suffered oppression and made noble sacrifices for the sake of conscience, helped to found our great Western civilization, or rallied to the defense of the infant nation when its life hung in the balance. Not to take a genuine interest in one's forefathers is almost as indefensible as to be vain because they were in some way notable. The more one studies the lives and the

society of the past, the more evident becomes the steady progress of the human race towards nobler living. In the thoughtful scholar the study of genealogy is likely to develop a deeper realization of the divine Providence and goodness, and also of the sterling worth of human nature, in spite of its many, and often grave, defects.

Archibald Lewis, Adjutant on return of Col. Vose's Regt. for money allowed by resolve of Feb. 6, 1779. Name cancelled on roll.

Archilaus Lewis, 1st Lieut., Capt. George Smith's co., Col. Joseph Vose's Regt., dated Camp near Valley Forge, Jan. 6, 1778; enlisted or appointed Jan. 1, 1777; service 12 mos. 5 days. Reported sick in the country.

Arnold Lewis, private, Capt. Wm. Clark's co., Col. Benj. Symond's Regt., enlisted Aug. 17, 1777, discharged Aug. 20, 1777, 3 days. Marched from Gageborough to Bennington on alarm, by order of Gen. Stark.

Arnold Lewes, private, Capt. Wm. Clark's co., enlisted Oct. 13, 1780; discharged Oct. 18, 1780, 6 days; marched from Windsor to Shafts bury by order of Gen. Fellows.

Asa Lewes, Sergeant, Capt. Thomas Cole's co., Col. Christopher Greene's Regt., 1st R. I. Battalion; dated East Greenwich, Aug. 3 1779 for July, 1779; Reported enlisted

- during war. Reported sick, absent.
- Asa Lewis appears on list of men enlisted from Hampshire co. for term of nine months after their arrival at Fishkill; age 16 yrs.; stature 5 ft. 5 in.; complexion black; from Northampton; belonging to Capt. Wale's co., Col. Chapen's Regt.; arrival at Fishkill June 16.
- Asa Lewis, appears on list of men residence Westfield.
- Asa Laes, private, Capt. George Rogers' co., 2d Cumberland co. Regt.; detached by order of Col. Jon. Mitchell to work on Fort at Falmouth, 6 days' service in Nov. 1775.
- Athanatious Lewis, Capt. James Lincoln's co., (stationed at Hingham) enlisted Jan. 1, 1776; discharged Jan. 28, 1776, 27 days; residence Hingham.
- Atherton Lewis, private, Capt. James Lincoln's co.; enlisted May 5, 1775; discharged Jan. 1, 1776; service 7 mos. 26 days; residence Hingham; stationed at Hingham.
- Barnard Lewis, Capt. John McKinstrey's co., Col. John Patterson's Regt. (26th) on order for bounty coat for 8 mos. service in 1775, dated Charlestown Oct. 26, 1775 (Fort 3), residence Sharon.
- Baron Luies, private, Capt. Peleg Peck's co., Col. George Williams' Regt. for R. I. service; enlisted Sept. 29, 1777, discharged Oct. 30, 1777. Stationed at Triverton, marched on secret expedition under Maj. Gen. Spencer.
- Barzillai Lewis (drummer) Capt. John Ford's co., Col. Ebenr. Bridge's (27th) Regt.; enlisted May 6, 1775 to Aug. 1, 1775; 3 mos. 3 days. Belonged Chelmsford.
- Bela Luass, private, Capt. Joseph Loper's co., Col. Theophilus Cotton's Regt. for service at R. I. on alarm; enlisted Mch. 5, 1781; discharged Mch. 20, 1781, 15 days.
- Daniel Luis, private, Capt. John Wood's co., Col. Baldwin's (26th) Regt., for May and June roll dated New York July 16, 1776.
- Daniel Lewis, private, Lt. James McKnight's co., Col. David Rossiter's Regt.; enlisted Oct. 15, 1780, discharged Oct. 18, 1780, 3 days. Marched to Bennington on alarm by order of Gen. Fellows.
- Daniel Lewis, private, in the Reading Training Band under Capt. John Walton, May 13, 1775.
- Daniel Lewis, private, on return for advance pay, etc., 1776. Capt. John Wood's co., Col. Baldwin's Regt.; also on return for mileage and subsistence 1776; on rolls for March and April, 1776. Reported deceased.
- Daniel Lewis, on receipt for wages to May 10, 1783, dated May 21, 1783, given by Oliver Barker, received of Thos. Russell service on board the Frigate Hague, J. Manley, Capt.
- Darell Lewis, seaman on list of prisoners, sent to Boston in the Cartel Snow Swift from Halifax, Sept. 30, 1778.
- Darius Lewis, private, Capt. Aaron Rowley's co., Col. John Ashley's Regt.; enlisted July 22, 1777; discharged Aug. 13, 1777, 23 days. A Berkshire co. detachment raised for public service at Stillwater.
- Darius Lewis, Sergeant, Capt. Peter Porter's co.; enlisted July 1, 1778, discharged Oct. 31, 1778, 4 months' service. A Berkshire co. detachment doing duty at Albany under Gen. Stark by order of General Court of June 10, 1778.
- Darius Lewis, private, Capt. Oliver Belding's co., Maj. Caleb Hyde's Regt.; enlisted July 8, 1777; discharged July 26, 1777, 19 days.

- Also served in Northern Army in same co. from July 1, 1778, to Oct. 31, 1778. 4 months.

- David Lewis on Descriptive List of men belonging to Walpole: age 16, stat. 5 ft. 6½ inches, complexion light, hair brown, eyes blue; term of enlistment 3 mos. 24 days. Detached from Capt. Mann's co. by Resolve of June 30, 1781.
- David Lewis, private, on order for bounty coat due for the 8 mos. service in 1775. Capt. Ezra Newhall's co., Lt. Col. Israel Hutchinson's Regt., dated Winter Hill Nov. 4, 1775, (19th Regt.) belonged in Lynn. Also marched from Lynn on alarm of Apr. 19, 1775, 16 days service.
- David Lewis, private, on Descriptive List of enlisted men, belonging to Freetown, age 16 yrs., stature 5 ft. 5 in., complexion black, hair black; occupation laborer; enlisted July 4, (year not given); term for 3 years. Joined Capt. Eliphalet Thorp's co., Lt. Col. J. Brooks' 7th Regt. Dated Feb. 20, 1782. Reported on duty on roll dated Peeks-kill Sept. 1, 1781, in above co., as on command on roll dated Peeks-kill Oct. 18, 1781. On roll dated York Huts Jan. 17, 1782, sick at New Windsor. On roll dated York Huts Dec. 17, 1781, sick in General Hospital.
- David Lewis, private, Capt. Amos Washburn's co., Col. Ebenezer Sprout's Regt.; enlisted Sept. 5, 1778; discharged Sept. 10, 1778, 6 days. Dated at Middleborough Apr. 2, 1783. Marched on alarm at Dartmouth, also enlisted Dec. 1776, discharged Dec. 1776, 4 days service. Belonged in Middleborough. Marched on occasion of capture of Newport, R. I., by the enemy.

Nehemiah Lewis, His Book, 1774.  
I was Bourn in the year 1739, September 11th.

The Very Path that he Should Go.  
That when the Bells for him Shall Toll.  
God will have Marcy on his Soul.

I was Married the 24th Day of June 1761 To my Beloved Wife, Sarah Beach, who Departed this Life, January, the 18, 1763, Aged 19.

It was the 9th Day of August 1764, I was Married to my Secont Wife, Sarah Peck.

My Wife Sarah Peck was Bourn January 23, 1742.

1795. It was the 13th Day of January 1795 my Beloved wife Sarah Peck, Departed this Life much Lamented. But in Faith of a Glori as Reward in the World of Spirits with God. Amen.

Nehemiah Lewis Departed this Life July 30, 1810.

#### CHAPTER CXXXVI.

#### FROM SWIFT'S BARNSTABLE FAMILIES.

Edward Lewes (8) son of George (1) resided at Rowley's pond, now known as Hathaway's pond, Jan. 12, 1662-3. George Lewes, Sen. and Geo. Lewes, Jr., had the great lot of the father by a joint deed to Edward Lewes and his brother John Lewes. Edward (8) had the northerly part, containing 27½ acres. No house is named in the deed, and the presumption is that it was built by Edward. In 1697 Edward Lewes (8) and his sons Ebenezer (315), John (127) and Thomas (47), are called South Sea men, and their proportions of the common meadows in the first and second divisions thereof were set off to them in the easternly part of the Wequaquet meadows. The families of Edward Lewes, Dolar Davis and John Linnel, were connected by intermarriages, and their lands and meadows at the South Sea adjoined. Although these families were called South Sea residents, they were assessed as belonging to the district on the north of the town, not with Hyannis or Wequaquet. I am inclined to the opinion

that some of these families resided at the farm owned by John Dunn in 1720, and now known as Dunn's field, or on the other clearings in that vicinity. This view of the matter affords a satisfactory explanation to the apparent incongruities of the town and assessors' records. No more barren land than George Lewes' great lot was cleared in Barnstable and though Edward Lewes (8) may have resided there for a time, it is certain that he did not remain long. It is probable he settled in the vicinity of Dunn's field, because the meadows allotted to him were near that field.

Edward Lewes (8) was occasionally employed as surveyor of lands, was on important town committees and sustained a good character.

He says that only one out of every ten claims around Dawson is paying wages. Those that pay at all are paying big money. On Eldorado Creek, he says, there are about three miles of really rich ground, and on Bonanza, every foot of which has been advertised as paying, there are more than twenty miles of absolutely worthless claims. Mr. Lewis explains that a man may work all winter and get out gravel that pans fairly, and yet when he takes account of stock in the spring, find that he has made hardly more than wages.

### THE MORAL ATTITUDE OF CORPORATIONS.

BY FRANCIS A. LEWIS AT THE CHURCH CONGRESS AT PITTSFIELD, MASS.

Mr. Lewis kept the audience in rapt attention through the whole of his bright and trenchant address which was often interrupted by laughter or applause.

He began by saying that this was a question which could not be discussed without exciting strong feeling. Those who criticised corporations were now-

adays in danger of being called socialists or demagogues; those who defended them either plutocrats or corporation hirelings. He would first of all point to the obvious advantages of corporations, which enabled large enterprises to be undertaken by the aggregation of small capitalists: they limited the liability of single capitalists and kept an enterprise exempt from the interruption caused by death.

They could have no moral attitude, for corporations were impersonal: in common parlance, "they have no soul." Yet when people talk, one would think them incorporated demons. They were charged with corrupting legislators and controlling elections by bribery: this surely was the fault of the electors themselves. The purchasable law-maker was a creation of the citizens who placed him where he was. They were accused of evading their business obligations: but individuals did the same. They were charged with forming trusts and combinations. What of the great department stores, and the greedy bargain hunters? He thought honors were even here. It was not true that corporations oppressed the laborers by underpaying them: often they were forced to reduce wages or close. Must they conduct business at a loss? They were not eleemosynary institutions. Besides, the public tried all it could to cheat corporations by evading payment of fare to public carriers and by instituting trumped-up suits for damages. In point of fact corporations were wronged by the people, yet they were the greatest institution of modern civilization.—From "*The Churchman*"
