- Elijah Lewis, sergeant, Capt. James Lincoln's co.; stationed at Hingham; enlisted May 16, 1775; discharged Jan. 1, 1776, 7 mos. 16 days; residence Hingham.
- Elijah Lewis, private, on warrant to pay dated June 25, 1784; Capt. Luke Howell's co.

Brooks' Regt., on roll of that co. dated York Huts, Feb., 1782, discharged by Gen. Washington, June 8, 1783, time having expired.

For convenience the records of the

The pension Bureau, Washington, has the following abstract of the War record of Nathaniel Lewis (489) v p 99, Vol. IX. He enlisted Feb. 1776 when 29 years old in Revolutionary war serving each year for various periods, the last time in 1780 when, as Lieutenant, he was stationed with his Company in defense of New Haven.

When 85 years old he applied for and received a pension till his death at 90.

Two at least of his descendants have joined the Daughters of the Revolution, one in the Wadsworth Chapter and the other in the Esther Stanley Chapter. Are there others?

Ward Lewis (8 v p 21 Vol. VII) was a native of Salisbury, Herkimer county, N. Y., where he was born Nov. 28, 1836. His father was Joseph Lewis, a commission merchant of Little Falls, his mother, Nancy Ward, daughter of John Ward of Sheffield. At the age of three years, upon the death of his mother, he came to his grandfather's home in Sheffield and resided in the family until 21 years old, enjoying the best of home training and such schooling as the neighborhood facilities afforded. On attaining his majority he engaged in the flour business in this village; saw this business grow to good proportions under his own management and that of the firm of Lewis & Warner and then Chapin & Co. In the late sixties he purchased the grist mill at Lenox Dale with which, except for a single year, he has since been connected, having had among his associates in its conduct, Wm. Perry, of Lee, and T. M. Chapin of this village. He

resided in Lenox Dale between the years 1874 and 1883 and served a portion of that period as postmaster. For a number of years Mr. Lewis had been identified with the hardware business here that is now conducted under the name of Burget & Lewis Company; he was one of the organizers of and was the manager and treasurer of the Great Barrington Electric Light Company; also had a large interest in the Great Barrington Coal Company and was a trustee in the Great Barrington Savings Bank. Mr. Lewis, in the fall of 1862 enlisted and was made a corporal in Co. D, 49th Massachusetts Volunteers, but, because of physical inability, was honorably discharged the following February. Politically, he had been a life long Democrat, earnest and much of the time active in the promotion of his party's cause, this largely influencing him to become financially and otherwise interested in the welfare of the Pittsfield *Journal*, the office of president of the Journal Company being held by him at the time of his death. Zealous as a Democrat, he was yet most tolerant and honorable in his attitude toward those differing with his political views. He had held but one office, that of county commissioner, but in that did faithful service.

In President Increase Mather's  
"Further Account of the Tryals of the  
New England Witches," printed in  
London, in 1693 is given Rev. Deodat  
Lawson's account of his visit to Salem.

"On the Nineteenth day of March  
last I went to Salem Village, and  
lodged at Nathaniel Ingersol's near  
to the Minister Mrs. P's House.

On Lord's Day, the Twentieth of  
March, there were sundry of the  
afflicted Persons at Meeting, as Mrs.  
Pope and Goodwife Bibber, Abigail  
Williams, Mary Walcut, Mary Lewes  
and Doctor Grigg's Maid. They had  
several sore Fits in the time of Public  
Worship, which did something inter-  
rupt me in my first Prayer, being so  
unusual. After Psalm was sung,  
Abigail Williams said to me, Now  
stand up, and name your Text!

On Monday the 21st of March, the  
Magistrates of Salem appointed to  
come to Examination of Goodwife C.  
[Cloyse. She was Sarah dau. of  
William Towne and 2d wife of Peter  
Cloyse. Her sister Rebecca m. Fran-  
cis Nurse and was executed as a witch  
July 19, 1692 and another sister Mary  
m. Isaac Esty and was executed as a  
witch on Sept. 22, 1692. Peter Cloyse  
was brother of Thomas (killed in

1690 at the second destruction of Fal-  
mouth by the French and Indians)  
who had m. Susannah Lewis (5) aunt  
of the "accusing girl" Mercy. They

denied, that the Part Parris took in

unfortunate Sisters." And again  
elsewhere he says, when speaking of  
one of them, "She appears to have  
been an amiable and exemplary

severely rebuked the accusing Girls  
for their Folly and Wickedness, when

testament in the Dutch tongue before  
William Bogardus, Notary Public,

and Martin Clock and Gerritt Daykinck, of the said city as witnesses. In this he did make grant and give unto his wife Geesie Lewis all his goods moveable and immoveable (by which words the Dutch understand a Personall and Reale Estate as houses lands, goods and chattles) Actions and rights as he should leave by his decease none Excepted and y't during her Life to Govern and administer and deall therewith as he himself being alive might or could do and after her Decease he Granted the same to his Children by name Lodwick, Barent, Leonard, Katherine and Thomas Lewis Junior, without any Distinction between the Sons and Daughters and that the Eldest Son should not pretend any prerogative therein."

Geesie Lewis was granted letters of Probate April 1, 1686; and believing she had full right to do so, disposed of sundry parts of the lands using the purchase money to pay her husband's debts and bring up her children. About 1718 she was advised that she had had no legal right to do this, wherefore the N. Y. Legislature passed June 24, 1719 "An Act for Settling the Estate of Thomas Lewis Late of the City of New York Deceased," confirming the title of the lands already sold by Geesie Lewis and providing for the distribution of the remainder after her death. From the text of this act I have learned and condensed these particulars. Also that between the probate of the will 1686, and the passage of the Act, 1719; Lodawick Lewis (2) had died without leaving issue.

Barent (3), Thomas (6), and Katharine (5) were also Dead Leaving Issue every one of them."

Leonard Lewis (4) was then (1719) living, also his mother Geesie Lewis, "who is now very antient."

At the Atbara was Lieutenant Colonel Lewis with an all-Egyptian brigade. The brigadier is one of the most popular officers in this or any other army. Colonel Lewis's talents and abounding vitality would have led him to distinction in any career. From the fact that he is affectionately known as "Taffy," it may be deduced that he is in whole or part a Welshman—certainly he is richly dowered with the vivacity, the energy, and the quickness of uptake of the Celt. He treats his staff and subordinates like younger brothers, and discipline never suffers. I have heard him say that he is always talking, but he is also always very much worth listening to.

Battle of Omdurman. Dervishes were firing at us from the top of Gabel Surgham, Dervishes were firing behind and to the right of it. The 13th Sudanese were bounding up the hill: Lewis's brigade had hastily faced to its right westward and was volleying for life: Maedonald's beyond, still facing northward, was a sheet of flashes and a roll of smoke.... Lewis and Maedonald, facing west and south, had formed a right angle. They were receiving the fire of the Khalifas'

division, and the charge of the Khalifa's horsemen; behind these the Khalifa's huge black standard was flapping raven-like.

[On Dec. 26, 1898 Colonel Lewis overtook Emir Ahmed Fedil with the remnants of the Dervish army, whom he defeated killing 500 of his followers and taking many prisoners. It is believed that Fedil's defeat is the final stroke.—ED.]
