Its large collections already contain many of the works needed, while its long list of Lewis alumni besides the many others who have taken unto themselves a Lewis for a helpmate would seem to point to it as the place.]

2. Can we not have a Lewis song, one containing the sentiment of the name with a rousing chorus to incite us and our descendants to pure and noble lives? Surely there are Lewises of enough ability to write a family song and set it to inspiring music. Get after the real Welsh-blood Lewises for this.

[The Editor hopes to hear from Leo Rich Lewis (690 Book 24, v. p. 168, Vol. IV) or some of the Lewises who took part in the International Eisteddfod of the World's Fair in this matter. some other Lewises unknown to Lewisiana will take a hand in the contest. The memory of him who composes this song will survive as long as the name Lewis shall endure. Helen Kendrick Johnson in her introduction to Our Familiar Songs, wrote, "They are the songs we have all sung, or wished we could sing; the songs our mothers crooned over our cradles, and our fathers hummed at their daily toil; the songs our sisters sang when they were the prima donnas of our juvenile world; the songs of our sweethearts and our boon companions; the songs that have swayed popular opinion, inspirited armies, sustained revolutions, honored the king, made presidents and marked historical epochs." Such a song the Lewises demand, not too long, four or five stanzas, set to some old familiar air such as we all know. Who will write it for Lewislana?

was born Aug. 22, 1848, at Richmond, Mo., son of Eugene Augustus and Parthenia A. (dau. of Walter L. Bransford) Lewis. His father was Judge of the Court of Appeals of St. Louis Mo., and Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Missouri, serving over thirteen years in the two offices. He was married April 4, 1876, to Pattie, daughter of Watson M. and Maria A. (Shores,)Cooke.

Mr. Lewis is much interested in Lewis genealogy and hopes his branch of the Lewis family will soon be traced. He is the great, great grandson of Samuel Lewis and Effie Davenport. This Samuel Lewis was born at Woodbridge, N. J., Jan'y 1, 1702, and may have been son of Thomas Lewis, of Woodbridge, N. J., who had charge of the "Stone Bridge" in 1702

Explanations, Abbreviations, etc.

For convenience the records of the various Lewis families are divided into Books and each Book into chapters. At the head of each Book appears the name of the earliest known ancestor of that family. The List of Books is a complete index to the Books as published to this time. New Books will be added from time to time as new branches of the Lewis family are found. As soon as Books are proved parts of others they will be merged into the Books to which they belong. Each name is numbered when first printed and whenever the name is repeated this number follows in brackets. The abbreviations commonly used in genealogical work are used; as b. for born; d. died; m. married; m. (1) first wife; dau, daughter: unm. not married; v. p. see page; etc Instead of repeating the name of a place in the same paragraph initials only are frequently given.

Hints for Contributors.

In writing matter for the printer use only one side of the sheet, note paper preferred. In giving dates, give year, month and day whenever known. Write all middle nameş in full. Answer the following questions as fully as possible and give names and addresses of such people as you think may be able to complete the record but get it yourself if possible and spare the editor. Old newspaper files, tom's stones, family Bibles and records, official records of the town, school and church, burial certificates, county and probate records, old deeds and letters are some of the more important sources of information. Don't forget however the stores of information which the old people can give-Get them interested and then "pump them Most important don't get discouraged yourself. How can you interest others, if you yourself are not alive with enthusiasm?

CHAPTER LIII.

Journal of Col. Charles Lewis continued. October 26.—This day Lieutenant Walter Stuart showed me the Fort. It is a quadrangular fort with four bastions, about four hundred feet in the square; has eleven four-pounders and two smaller mounted. It is situated on the north side of Potomac, in Maryland, on a hill very pleasant, more so, I think, than advantageous; has a very romantic prospect from the mountain, and is very healthy. I

was this day ordered to return to Fredericksburg, but my horse being tired, I was excused.

October 27, 28, 29, and 30.—Nothing remarkable.

October 31.-An Irishman arrived at the fort with two scalps. 'It seems he was, the Sunday before, taken prisoner by a party of fifty-two Indians, and being left in custody of two while the party proceeded toward the inhabitants, he, with his guard arrived at the Shanol Camp, and encamped in a deserted house. About eleven o'clock he was ordered to make up the fire, but refusing so to do, was threatened the tomahawk, but accidentally casting his eye on an axe in the house, very convenient to him, he, with it, beat out the brains of the Indian next to him, and with his gun shot the other through the body. Having escaped them he made the best of his way to Fort Cumberland with their scalps, guns, I bought one of the guns for horses, etc. shillings, Maryland currency, being a French piece, verv handsome This equally good. day a party of volunteers, consisting of one hundred men, rank and file, and eight officers, were defeated. The Indians having disclosed their designs to McIrvain, their prisoner, it is not doubted the party will cut them off.

November 1, 2, 3.—Nothing remarkable.

November 4.—The volunteers returned without success; the Indians being supposed to have returned.

November 13.— Colonel Stevens arrived this day with about one hundred recruits with their proper officers: Captains Robert Spotswood and William Peachy; Lieutenants John Hall and King; two volunteers.

November 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19.—Nothing material.

November 20.—Ensign Bacon arrived at the fort from Patterson's creek, where he had been to creet a fort. Oh his way he heard the Indian halloo and saw many tacks of Indians in the woods. Book XLIV.

Though he had violated no law, human or divine, though he had acted strictly and equally in self-defence against a lawless power and oppression, yet the occurrence took place in a monarchical government, whose policy it is to preserve a difference in the ranks of society. One of the nobility had been slain by one of his tenants. The connections of the young Lord were rich and powerful; those of Lewis poor and humble. With such fearful odds it was deemed rash and unwise that Lewis with law and justice on his side should surrender himself up to the officers of justice and stand his trial. It was consequently de termined that Lewis should proceed on that evening in female dress to the nearest seaport, and take shipping for Oporto in Portugal, where a brother of his wife had established himself in the trade of merchandise. He luckly met with a vessel just ready to sail from the Bay of Donnegal. He took passage in her, and after various adventures arrived in Oporto in the year 1729. Upon his arrival there he was advised by his brother-in-law, in order to evade the pursuit of his enemies, to proceed to Philadelphia, the capital of Pennsylvania in North America and there await the arrival of his family, whose removal from Ireland his brother-in-law undertook to effect. Lewis in pursuance of this advice proceeded to Philadelphia, and there awaited the arrival of his family. about one year after he had been there, his family joined him; and hearing from them of the industrious efforts which the friends of the deceased Lord were making to discover the country to which he had fled, Lewis determined, in order to clude all further harassments, to penetrate deeply into the American forest. He accordingly after the arrival of his family removed

from Philadelphia to Lancaster, Pennsylvania, where he spent the winter of 1731-2. In the summer of 1732 he removed to the place near Staunton in Augusta county, Virginia, now owned by David W. Pateson, where he settled and raised his family, conquered the country from the Indians, and acquired a large fortune. At the time he settled at the above place, Augusta Co. was not formed; the country was in the possession of the Indians; there were scarcely any white inhabitants; and Staunton was not known.

Washington's sister Bettie, and she has many valuable reminders of the great leader. She occasionally wears at her throat three large irregular white shell buttons, which the first President wore on his first lnaugural coat.

An onyx snuff box, gold lined and orna mented, which was presented by General Washington to his niece. Miss Betty Lewis who became the wife of Chas. Carter, of Frederick, Va., has come into the possession of the Connecticut Historical society of Hartford, Ct. The box, which is regarded as a valuable relic, was given by Mrs. Carter to a personal friend, Mrs. Daniel Brown. She at her death transmitted it to her son, Henry I. Brown of Lynchburg.

Point Pleasant, W. Va., May 21.— The people are making an effort to raise money to erect a monument to the memory of General Lewis, who was killed in the battle between the Indians and the whites in 1774. NEW HAVEN, Conn., June 11.—The annual convention of the Protestant Episco-

A valuable paper has been issued by the North Carolina State Board of Health, presenting facts to show that malarial diseases are due to impure drinking-water rather than to bad air. The paper was compiled by Dr. R. H. Lewis, the Secretary of the board, who has made a thorough study of the subject with a view to finding out what conditions of living and habit will render the people of his state most free from malarial infection. Dr. Lewis shows that malaria is most common among persons who use "surface water," which includes water from "shallow wells" and "branch or ditch water." On the other hand, exemption from it has been obtained by many large and small communities that drink only water from deep driven wells, artesian wells, and cisterns.

The Lewis, with its tail-piece, the Har ris, is quite a sizable island to be appended to such a country as Scotland. It is a number of miles long, and another number of miles wide, and it has a number of thousand inhabitants—I should say as many as three-quarters of an inhabitant to the square mile—and the conditions of agriculture and the fisheries are extremely interesting and quarrelsome.
