GENEALOGICAL RECORDS.

Explanations, Abbreviations, etc.

For convenience the records of the various Lewis families are divided into Books and each Book into chapters. the head of each Book appears the name of the earliest known ancestor of that family. The List of Books is a complete index to the Books as published to this New Books will be added from time to time as new branches of the Lewis family are found. As soon as Books are proved parts of others they will be merged into the Books to which they belong. Each name is numbered when first printed and whenever the name is repeated this number follows in brackets. The abbreviations commonly used in genealogical work are used; as b. for born; d. died; m. married; m. (1) first wife; dau. daughter; unm. not married; v. p. see page; etc. Instead of repeating the name of a place in the same paragraph initials only are frequently given.

Hints for Contributors.

In writing matter for the printer use only one side of the sheet, note paper preferred. In giving dates, give year, month and day whenever known. Write all middle names in full. Answer the following questions as fully as possible and give names and addresses of such people as you think may be able to complete the record but get it yourself if possible and spare the editor. Old newspaper files, tomb stones, family Bibles and records, official records of the town, school and church, burial certificates, county and probate records, old deeds and letters are some of the more important sources of information. Don't forget however the stores of information which the old people can give-Get them interested and then "pump them dry." Most important of don't get discouraged yourself. How can you interest others, if you yourself are not alive with enthusiasm?

Book VIII.

JOHN LEWIS, Westerly, R. I., 1661.

BY MRS. JOHN L. KENYON, WYOMING, R. I.

About three quarters of a mile from our village, on the farm owned by George Perry Card, lies side of an old wall in a meadow, an old burial ground containing over thirty graves. The legible stones are of the Card family. But two large stones three and a half feet in width and six inches thick that must have been considered nice for the time, although of our common granite, excited my curiosity to such an extent that I spent more than an hour one day trying to decipher their inscriptions for I found that they were lettered

all over. But moss-grown stones that have stood over 175 years with words commenced on one side and finished on the other are not easily deciphered. On a second visit I found that if I followed the letters with a sharp stick and then followed with a piece of chalk that I had the in scription:

1717

THE BODY OF IEAN LEWIS A KIND & FAITH FULL WIFE WHO ON MARCH THE 23 ENDED THIS LIFE IN THE 51 YEAR OF HER AGE.

HERE LIETH
THE BODY OF
ISREL LEWIS WHO
WAS THE FAITHFYL
HVSBAND OF MARY
LEWIS AND HE END
ED THIS LIFE IVNE
28 1719 & 50 YEAR
OF HIS AGE

Israel Lewis (7) owned land in the "Little Purchase" and his brother David (6) owned two tracts in the "Shannock Purchase," yet their farms were side by side. My ancestor, David Kenyon, owned tetween them but I think must have purchased from one of them. His farm was not a quarter of a mile in width and on the south the Lewises went clear around him and met, as his farm extended more to the north and east extending through the woods for nearly a mile beside David's land.

Knowing that it was a custom in those days for each to bury on his own land even if his father's family were buried

within a mile of the place, and remembering that there was another smaller yard about a quarter of a mile from there containing graves, "said to be Indians," I went there. I worked hours with water and brush, stick and chalk, over the only one that had an inscription, a stone of the same style as those above but had fallen and was partly covered with dirt. It read

HERE LIES TH
E BODY OF DA
VID LEWIS & FAITHFVL
HVSBAND OF ELIZABE
TH LEWIS & HE DIED
SEPTEMBER YXI TH
& IN THE 51 YEAR
OF HIS AGE
1718

The stones here, no others marked, are arranged as follows:



We may suppose that side of David is his wife. The others—who knows?

Ed.] Benjamin d. 1803 and his wife d. 1823, are both buried in this Card burial ground and their graves marked.

CHAPTER CCXIV

By the Editor

The foregoing chapter, one of the most important chapters ever published in Book VIII, will undoubtedly receive the care ful attention it deserves. The hint it gives concerning old stones "said to be Indian graves, will, it is hoped, be suggestive to many who live near such burial grounds and many, north and south, east and west, will "go and do likewise."

The exact dates of death of these brothers, David and Israel, have never been published as yet. Now we have their death and probably as much concerning the date of their birth as will ever be known. Also this seems to be conclusive that Israel (7) m. (2) Mar. 27, 1718 in Westerly, R. I., by Joseph Hull, J. P., Mary Mash. (The name is spelled several different ways on the records.) Elisha (1700 v. pp. 119 and 147, Vol. IV.) is then son of Israel (7) and not of Elisha (39) for Richmond, R. I. records give ch. of Israel (7) d. June 28, 1719, first 5 by m. (1) last by m. (2).

To overcome the difficulties which prevented the general enjoyment of free education, Mr. Lewis [Samuel 918, v. pp. 24 and 103 Vol. VI. Ed. | recommended a state fund to be equally distributed; better economy in the administration of school laws; the privilege of loans for building school houses; the establishment of school libraries; the publication of a school journal; and proper care of the lands given in trust to the legislature for the support of free schools. [The majority of his recommendations although bitterly opposed, were adopted. He was Ohio's first Superintendent of schools, being elected by the legislature in 1837. held the office for three years when he was compelled to resign on account of his health.-Ed.]

Governors, secretaries of state, and cdueational men of wide knowledge, have almost without exception, from 1840 till the present time, borne willing testimony to the fact, that by Mr. Lewis' industry, wisdom and eloquence, the whole educational tone of the state was elevated, and the most fruitful seeds were sown for that which bears now to every child in Ohio the privilege of a good education. one, who studies the events of his superintendentship, and the results which have followed it, with an unbiased mind, will dispute even higher claims for Mr. Lewis as a friend of popular education, than we now set up.

Finally it is not to be denied that in the present excellent school system of Ohio, the forethought and practical suggestions of Samuel Lewis, put on record in 1837, 1838 and 1839, are embodied to a greater extent than those of any other man.

It was during her sojourn at this school, while spending a holiday with her sister, Mrs. Massie, [Susannalı Preston (181) m. Capt. Henry Massie, (v. Chapter 45,)] at the Valley Farm, that she first met John Howe Peyton, then in the zenith of his professional success and one of the handsomest and most accomplished men in Virginia.....It was a fortunate marriage and brought her all the happiness promised by a union with the chosen of her heart. Her home was thereafter in Staunton for a few years and subsequently till her death at Montgomery Hall. She thus returned to the original location of her great grandfather the "lord of the hills," to pass her life amidst the scenes rendered historic by his and his brave companions' long struggle with their savage enemies and almost within sight of the ruins of that Fort Lewis, under whose stout walls the colony grew in time, strong enough to defy every foe.

In her new home Anne Peyton soon developed more fully the noble qualities which so much endeared her to a numerous circle of friends and the intellectual parts by which she was afterward so widely known. There was no object of a humane and laudable kind to which she did not devote her time and attention, but particularly was her active philanthropy displayed in connexion with the large slave population on her husbands estates.

CHAPTER XXIII.

By Walter Lewis Patteson, Springfield, Ills., in the "Lewis Congress."

I append below a short sketch written by my mother of her life. It is plainly but a skeleton upon which she expected to build a fuller narrative, but in itself it is characteristic in its simple statement of actual facts, with no attempt at display.

I, Jean Wood Patteson, the fourth dau. and seventh child of John Lewis, was born on the 22d of September, 1822, at Llangollen, in Spotsylvania-co., Va. In September of 1832, when I was ten years old, my father moved to Georgetown, Scott-co, Ky., where, with his brother, Rev. Addison M. Lewis, he had charge of a large female academy. He lived in Georgetown nearly three years and then removed to a farm on Elkhorn, in Franklin-co., about six miles from Frankfort, on the Georgetown and Frankfort turnpike. This place he named Llangollen, after his former residence in Virginia. Here he taught a private school, which I attended until I was about sixteen years old. At the age of eighteen and a half, I was married on the evening of the 24th of February, 1841, to Alexander Augustus Patteson, who lived then at the Forks of Elkhorn, near my father's house. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Achilles DeGrasse Sears, a minister of the Baptist denomination, and was the first

marriage ceremony ever performed by him.

John Lewis, my father, was the son of Coi. Zachary Lewis, of Bel air, Spotsylvania-co., Va., who was commissioned by Governor Dinwiddie at the same time with General Washington, and they were friends and at one time shared the same tent, and at parting exchanged swords. The sword given by Washington to my grandfather I have often seen, and my father at his death left it to his oldest grandson. Lewis married Anne Terrell, a lady of English descent, and they raised a large family, of whom my father was the third son. The founder of the Lewis family was Jean Louis, a French Huguenot, who fled from persecution at the time of the revocation of the edict of Nantes and settled in Wales. He afterwards became famous as a military man under the Duke of Marlborough and was made a field marshal and received the titles of Earl Ligonia and Baron Inniskillen as a reward for his bravery. His descendants settled in Virginia, and were some of them known in Revolutionary times, one branch being connected by marriage with the family of Washington. My father, John Lewis, married Jean Wood Daniel, a daughter of Travers Daniel, of Crow's Nest, on the Potomae river, in Stafford-co., Va., who was a grandson of Hannah Ball, the sister of Mary, the mother of Washington, and on the other side was descended from Sir Peter Daniel, who was High Sheriff of London. Travers Daniel married Frances Moncure, the daughter of an Episcopal clergyman of Scotch descent, and they raised a large family of whom my mother was the youngest daughter.

I am past fifty eight years old, have lived a quiet, uneventful, but mostly a happy life; have of course had some trials and difficulties to encounter, but have also had a great many blessings to be thankful for.

DEATHS.

In Kansas City, Dec. 5, 1895, of old age, Margaret Ann, wife of Thomas Lewis, ac. 86 years. Of the ch. one son is a banker at Cairo, Ill., another lives in Kansas and a dau, is the wife of S. D. Ayer, of Kansas City. She married Mr. Lewis 63 years ago. He is 88 years old, but is unusually strong and hearty for one of that greatage. Mr. Lewis was one of the old time newspaper editors and publishers in the early days of Illinois. He was a prominent man in Springfield and Cairo in those days, and was an associate of Lincoln and Douglas. Mr. Lewis came to Kansas City five years ago and has been in the book business there.

In Kansas City, Ira Lewis. He was a native of Oswego, N. Y., as is also Mrs. Lewis, who survives her husband. They

left that city in 1864 and settled in Cleveland, O., where they made their home for fifteen years. In 1879 Mr. Lewis moved his family to Kansas City, where he was president of the Lewis Paint Co. Besides his wife Mr. Lewis leaves three sons and two daughters, one of whom, Mrs. Adams is married to an army officer in Detroit.

In Hartford, Ct., Dec. 20, 1895, Charles Lewis, killed by a trolley car. He was 29 years old, single, a painter by trade, and lived with his father and mother, the latter of whom is blind. One sister, Mrs. Adelbert Hayes, survives. Her husband was buried the day of Lewis' death, and he attended the funeral.

In Pawtucket, R. I., Dec. 8, 1895, Sabin Lewis Hawkins (13 LVIII v p 109, Vol. V.) The successful manager of many large farms in R. I. and eastern Conn., he spent his last years with his dau. (d. Aug. 1894; his wife d. 1875) in Central Village, Ct., and his son, George Nelson Hawkins, a prominent stucco worker of Pawtucket. Mr. Hawkins was a plain, unpretending and quiet man, strictly temperate in his habits and a strong Republican. He is the last of the family.
