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

Lewis High School.

(Concluded from last issue.)

The will of Mr. Addin Lewis read that "the remaining ten thousand dollars said society shall hold as a permanent fund for the school or schools of said Academical Institution. and the nett income of said fund shall be used for the benefit and encouragement of said Institution in paying teachers and other expenses: and said society shall annually appoint not exceeding five persons to be the Trustees of said Academical Institution. which Trustees shall be members of the Congregational and Baptest societies in said town; and no religious preference whatever shall ever be given in the admission of pupils to the privileges of said Institution."

The conditions of the will were that the town should raise the sum of \$2,000 "before the said School Society of the Town of Southington shall have right to demand any part of said fifteen thousand dollars as an addition to said permanent fund."

It was not till September. 1846. that the \$2,000 was raised, and a committee appointed to erect a suitable building. "It was voted, September 21st, 1846. that the name Lewis Academy be given to the Institution, in honor of its Founder." The building was opened for pupils in the fall of 1848.

With but few repairs this building was used for school purposes until 1892, when an effort was made to have a larger and more commodious building erected: but finally \$3,000 was expended in making changes in and repairing the old building.

The accommodations still proving insufficient, four years later the town voted to erect a new High School building at a cost not to exceed \$30,000, to be furnished with the latest and most modern equipments, heating apparatus, etc. Prof. H. W. Rice, who had successfully conducted the school for several previous years, was installed in the new building as principal, at the commencement of the winter term of 1896.—Southington Phoenix. FROM TIMLOW'S HISTORY OF SOUTH-INGTON.

In a memorandum of his it reads: "I began study July 31. 1775. in the 19th year of my age. I was admitted a member of Yale College Aug. 30, A. D. 1776. Was made a Free Mason at New Haven, Apr. 15. 1779; was raised to the degree of Master Mason June 3, 1779. September 13, 1780, received the degree of Bachelor of Arts at Yale College, Actatis 23 vears 5 months."

Portions of a journal he began to write Sept. 13, 1780. are in existence.

"This day was nencement and my Class all recv'u their first Degrees; the Ceremonies were performed in a private manner in the Chapel and Library; we were called into the Library at 11 oClock and delivered the President our Diplomas, and his money for signing and then withdrew, at 4 oClock the Masters and Bachelors went into the Chapel and the President read a general' Diploma, and delivered as well our Diplomas, the evening was very rainy and dark-there was a Ball, but I was too unwell to attend-Thursday, Sept. 14-The morning was pleasant. I arose as soon as Sol. and fetch'd up my horse and rode homeward. Mr. Law and Nott and Williams rode with me, we breakfasted at Munson's tavern mount Carmel. Law and Williams parted from Nott and me at Cheshire. Stop't at Hall's and drank, etc., then we had his company homewe arriv'd at 12 o. Dined and walk'd to Mr. Chapman's-at 3 o they left me."

He was engaged to Sarah, dau. of Rev. Mr. Chapman, who remained single and died Jany. 10, 1804. He d. of yellow fever at Savannah Oct. 12, 1784.

CHAPTER CXX.

FROM HISTORY OF PLYMOUTH, CT.

Hon. John Calhoun Lewis (427 v p 121, Vol. IV) was b. in Cornwall, Ct., in 1800. He was a grand son of Nehemiah Lewis (148 v p 121 Vol. IV), who served in the war of the Revolution, and who settled the town of Goshen, a direct descendant of Capt. William Lewis (2), the first registrar in Farmington, who came from England with his father, William Lewis (1), in the Ship Lion in 1632. John Calhoun Lewis (427) was the eldest of a family of five brothers, all of whom

became conspicuous citizens of the State. His father, [William (421 v p121 Vol IV) ED.], was for years postmaster at Cornwall, while John (427, and Philo (428) were each in turn postmaster at Terryville. One brother, Miles (1007), was for 23 years a highly esteemed captain of the New Haven Steamboat Co., and another, Henry Gould (1008 b. Sept. 9, 1820 v p 149 Vol. V) was nine times elected Mayor of the city of New Haven.

FROM THWAITES "AFLOAT ON THE CHIO."

On the 10th of October from dawn until dusk, was here waged in a gloomy forest one of the most bloody and stubborn hand-to-hand battles ever fought between Indians and whites, especially notable, too, because for the first time the rivals were about equal in number. The Point I'leasant of to-day is a dull, sleepy town of twenty-five hundred inhabitants, with that unkempt air and preponderance of negroes, so common to small Scuthern communities. The bottom is rolling, fringed with large hills, and on the Ohio side drops suddenly for fifty feet to a shelving beach of gravel and clay. Crocked Creek, in whose narrow, winding valley some of the severest fighting was had, emties into the Kanawha a half-mile up the stream, at the back of the town. It was painful to meet several men of intelligence, who had long been engaged in trade here, to whom the Battle of Point Pleasant was a shadowy event. whose date they could not fix, nor whose importance understand; it seemed to be little more a part of their lives. than an obscure contest between Matabeles and whites. in far-off Africa. It is time that our Western and Southern folk were awakened to an appreciation of the fact that they have a history at their doors, quite as significant in the annals of civilization as that which induces pilgrimages to Ticonderoga and Bunker Hill.
