CHAPTER CXXI.

WHO WERE THE CHILDREN OF GEORGE LEWES?

The time has come when it seems necessary for LEWISIANA to take some stand on this question. Deane in his History of Scituate gives one set of children, Savage in his Genealogical Dictionary another while later writers have followed one or both. Mr. George Lewis of Hingham who ed, and died in Falmouth after 1703. started the records of this Book in but these records failed to show our paper gave the number as ten and where he resided from 1670 to 1677. then omitted one who undoubtedly was This gap covers the period when Mr. a child of George Lewes. been assigned in the pages of our family paper no less than three different sets of children. The late Amos Otis Esq., than whom no one was better posted in Barnstable genealogy wrote after careful investigation. "The identity of the names in the families of George Lewes of Barnstable, and Edmund Lewes of Lynn, misled Mr. Deane. He that carefully compares the genealogy of these families will be satisfied that Mr. Deane erred in saving George Lewes had sons Nathaniel, 1645, and Joseph. 1647. born in Barnstable. These names do not occur in the town or church records, nor in the will of Goodman Lewes, though he names all his other children. Mr. Deane also says that Thomas (4), son of George removed from Barnstable to Swansey, and there had Samuel 1672. and Hepsibah 1674, and that Joseph of Hingham (Book XLII v p 27, Vol. VIII) was son of George. These errors have been copied and perpetuated by the many who have undertaken to write the genealogy of the Lewis family.

In the investigation of the history of Thomas Lewes (4), I have been aided by Thomas Lewis, Jr., Esq., and S. P. Bourne, Esq., of Falmouth. The colonial records, the town and church of Barnstable and of Falmouth, the Probate and the records of the proprietors of Suckenessett have been carefully examined. The result of the investigation is this. he was a son of George Lewes. married and lived in Barnstable as stat-

and Hepsibah. 15th Nov., 1674. Mr. Deane's statement of his removal to into five houselots of eight acres each. Swansea is apparently right: but there are other records and other conflicting facts. Thomas Lewis of Lynn (3.XXXIII v p 8 Vol IV), son of Edmund. whose wife was Hannah Baker. removed to Swansea about 1670. I have not space to state all the facts [but for LEWISIANA and its readers the question is of such importance that all the facts are:essential and the pages of LEWISIANA are open to whomever can produce them.-ED.]. The evidence in my judgment is conclusive. that Thomas Lewis of Swansea was a son of Edmund of Lynn. The subsequent history of his family is known -he was not a son of George of Barnstable."

CHAPTER CXXII.

FROM SWIFT'S BARNSTABLE FAMI-LIES.

Before October, 1636, Goodman Lewes had built a house on Kent street, in Scituate, so named because the residents thereon came from that county, and were known as "the men of Kent." His lot was the first south of Meeting House Lane and contained five acres, and his house built thereon stands No. 18 on Mr. Lothrop's list of the houses built in that town. On the removal of Goodman Lewes in 1639 to Barnstable, he sold to Richard Willis of Plymouth. his dwelling house and lot containing five acres, one acre and three-fourths of swamp. and three acres of marsh ground, and his right to commonage for the sum of £19 sterling.

George Lewes's (1) home lot in Barastable was the second west of the Hyannis road. The land on the south side of the highway, between that road and Freeman Hinckley's or

old Court House Lane, was divided or four between Hyannis Rcad and the Railroad Avenue. Mr. Nathaniel Holmes and his sons are the present owners of the Lewes lot. He also owned an acre of meadow on the opposite side of the highway, with the high hill on the north, still known as Lewes Hill. He had ten acres of land in the old common field, now owned by Solomon Hinckley and Alvan Howes, and four acres of marsh at Sandy Neck.

His lots were as good planting lands as any in the east parish. "Ultima die Januarii, 1654"-5, he sold these four parcels of real estate in Barnstable, with his dwelling-house, to Samuel Mayo for £28.5 shillings sterling. He owned three acres and a half of meadow at Mystic Landing granted to him by the town July 26. 1654. This he sold May 27, 1661, to John Thompson.

His great lot is thus described on the records: "Sixty acres of upland more or less lyeing by ye pond commonly called Rowley's pond, at ye easterly end thereof, running 80 rods easterly, and 120 southerly and norththerly, that is to say, from outside to outside." This tract of land he sold to his sons Edward and John in 1652 and some part of it is yet owned, by Whether George his descendants. Lewes ever resided on this land I am not informed. His son Edward's (8) house stood on the northeast of the pond, called at first Rowley's, then Lewes's and now Hathaway's pond.

In 1654, before the sale of his estate toSamuel Mayo, Goodman Lewes had "let and farmed for some certain years." the estate of Mr. Dimmock. whose health was feeble. It appears that he occupied for a number of years the ancient fortification house.

It has always been a tradition that Joseph Lewis of Swansea was in the King Philip's war and was among the first to fall. Deane's History of Seituate and Lewis' History of Lynn both state that such was the fact but it has been difficult to get any historical data on the subject. The following communication taken from the New England Historical and Genealogical Register for Jan. 1898 p 145 seems to be conclusive.

According to Hubbard's Narrative of the Indian Wars .- "On the 24th of of June 1675 was the alarm of war first sounded in Plymouth Colony when eight or nine of the English were shin in and about Swansea" but no names were given.

He married, 1785, Elizabeth Barbara Sampson dau of Charles Sampson. They moved to Kentucky in 1791, where, in Mercer County, he died testator, 1833.

His grandson, John Lewis RoBards b in Hustonville, Ky., May 8, 1838 is Vice-President of the Missouri Society of the Sons of the American Revolution.

Colonel RoBards, as known to his friends, is a man of courtly, though commanding presence. With a genial disposition he unites a delicate sense of personal honor. His bearing is of that military type which is wont to challenge the attention of strangers. It is not in his nature to seek public position, and vet no citizen is more signally qualified for the higher honors of official station. Though hampered by a misfortune to his vision he has never desisted from arduous application to professional toil. There is a strong pathos in his zealous and lifelong devotion to the ethics of the law. He has been a close and constant student of legal science. No effort can

surpass in tenacity or in fidelity his preparation of a brief, nor can any reverse impair his fortitude. His successes at the bar have proved illustrious us well as substantial. He enjoys a capacity for infinite detail. No item escapes his vigilance. After so many years of busy employment he is never unready for account concerning any past transaction. Mount Olivet Cemetery, the principal adornment and the permanent pride of Hannibal, is his special work. as it will be his enduring memorial. and during a quarter of a century of noble effort in moments of intermission from professional cares he has wrought his benevolence to a standard of admirable excellence. The finest trait in his character is his singularly lofty and unfaltering devotion to his wife, his children and his domestic fireside. Conformably he is found richly endowed with purity of thought as well as of action. Rememberedas a boy with ruddy countenance and flaxen ringlets trailing on his shoulders. known as a man who has readily and triumphantly breasted the buffets of life, he will transmit to vet later days the untarnished inheritance of a good name and a distinguished record.
